

Job Ch 4 Men's Bible Study by Rick Burgess

Job Chapter 4 is the beginning of a lengthy exchange where Job's friend Eliphaz argues that Job's suffering must be a punishment for sin, citing tradition and a mystical vision. Eliphaz first praises Job's past righteousness but then contends that since God punishes wickedness, Job must have a hidden sin to be suffering so severely. He then recounts a vision in which a spirit questioned man's ability to be pure before God, suggesting that even angels err, thus reinforcing the idea that suffering is a consequence of sin.

Eliphaz's argument

Initial Praise: Eliphaz begins by acknowledging Job's past character, noting his kindness to the poor and weak.

Accusation of Hidden Sin: He immediately pivots, arguing that Job's immense suffering can only be a result of sin, claiming that the innocent and upright are never destroyed.

Retribution Principle: Eliphaz asserts that people who cause trouble will face trouble in return, implying Job has reaped what he has sown.

Mystical Vision: To support his point, he describes a frightening vision where a spirit questioned him about human righteousness and God's justice.

God's Justice: The spirit from the vision asks if a man can be pure before his Maker and notes that God finds fault even with his angels. Eliphaz uses this to argue that since all humans sin, Job must confess his own sins to end his suffering.
