Job Chapter 3

Job curses the day of his birth, expressing profound despair, a desire for death, and a sense of a broken and unjust world. After seven days of silent companionship with his friends, Job breaks his silence by lamenting his existence, questioning why he was not allowed to die as an infant and find rest in the grave.
