

Job Ch 10 Men's Bible Study by Rick Burgess

Job chapter 10, Job expresses his intense anguish and disgust with his life, complaining to God about his suffering. He questions why God, the creator who fashioned him in the womb, would now bring about his destruction, asks why God seems to favor the wicked, and wonders if it would have been better for him to have died before birth. This chapter highlights Job's struggle to reconcile his suffering with his understanding of divine justice, though he maintains a connection to God by addressing him directly.

- **Disgust with life:**

Job starts the chapter by stating he loathes his life and will speak in the bitterness of his soul, expressing the depth of his anguish.
