

Summary of Job Chapter 15 (Eliphaz's Second Speech)

Eliphaz the Temanite speaks again, delivering a harsh and more intense rebuke to Job than in his first speech (chapter 4–5).

Key points:

1. **Accusation of arrogance and emptiness** (vv. 1–6) Eliphaz says Job's words are nothing but hot air and wind. He accuses Job of being verbose, irreverent, and self-condemning—claiming that Job's own mouth proves his guilt because he is undermining reverence for God and speaking against Him.

4. **The fate of the wicked** (vv. 17–35) Drawing on traditional wisdom ("what the wise have observed"), Eliphaz paints a vivid, terrifying picture of how the wicked always suffer:
 - They are in constant pain and terror (v. 20–24).
 - Their prosperity is short-lived; they live in fear of destruction.
 - God opposes them; they are like a vine that loses its unripe grapes or an olive tree that drops its blossoms (vv. 30–33).
 - In the end, "the company of the godless is barren," and fire consumes their tents (v. 34).

Eliphaz's core message: Job's intense suffering is clear evidence that he must be wicked and is reaping what he has sown. He offers no sympathy, only condemnation, and doubles down on the traditional retribution theology: the wicked always suffer, the righteous prosper.

This speech deepens the tension between Job and his friends and sets up Job's anguished response in the following chapters.
