 - He longs for someone to testify on his behalf, believing that even now, his **Witness and Advocate is in heaven**—someone who sees his suffering and knows he is innocent.
 - He knows he is nearing death ("few years remain") and weeps as he thinks of facing God soon.

Overall tone: Job is exhausted, broken, and feels utterly abandoned—by friends and by God. Yet even in his despair, he clings to a glimmer of hope: there is a witness in heaven who knows the truth.
