Job Chapter 20 Summary – Zophar’s Second Speech

Zophar the Naamathite delivers a harsh, angry, and uncompromising speech. He is clearly offended by Job’s words in chapter 19 (especially Job’s confidence in his Redeemer and his warning that his friends might face judgment). Zophar insists that the traditional doctrine of retribution is absolutely true: the wicked always prosper only briefly and then suffer sudden, dramatic, and total destruction.

1. **Zophar’s Agitation and Introduction (vv. 1–3)** Zophar says Job’s rebuke has insulted and shamed him, and his spirit compels him to answer quickly.

 - He will suck the poison of cobras; riches will become gall and serpent venom within him.
 - He will not enjoy the profits of his trading—he swallowed riches and will spit them out.
4. **The Reason: Oppression and Injustice (vv. 19–23)** The core sin of the wicked is that they crushed and abandoned the poor, violently seized houses, and refused to help the needy. Because they never knew contentment, nothing they desired will be saved.
5. **Sudden and Total Destruction (vv. 24–29)**
 - When they think they are safe, God’s arrows and terrors will strike.
 - Bronze bows, iron weapons, lightning, darkness, flood, and fire will consume them.
 - Heaven will reveal their iniquity, and the earth will rise up against them.
 - Their wealth will be swept away “on the day of God’s wrath.” Zophar concludes: “This is the wicked man’s portion from God, the heritage decreed for him by God.”

Tone and Purpose

Zophar’s speech is the most ferocious and graphic of all the friends’ speeches so far.

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There is no compassion, no nuance, and no willingness to consider that Job might be innocent. He simply reapplies the retribution principle with maximum force: wicked people (like Job, in Zophar's view) always get what they deserve, and quickly. The imagery is deliberately repulsive—dung, vomit, snake venom—to drive home the point that any pleasure the wicked experience is fleeting and turns deadly.

In short, chapter 20 is Zophar doubling down: “Job, your suffering proves you are wicked, and wicked people always end in ruin—no exceptions.” This sets the stage for Job's powerful rebuttal in chapters 21 and beyond.
